**Apathy**: (noun) lack of emotion, feeling, interest or concern; indifference [apathetic, apathetically]

-Henri's **apathetic** attitude toward his work made most of his colleagues avoid him.

**Auspicious:** (adjective) showing or suggesting that future success is likely; attended by good fortune [auspiciously, auspiciousness. Antonym: inauspicious]

- After the auspicious release of his first book, Stephen King became a world-renowned horror writer.

**Contempt:** (noun) act of despising; lack of respect; willful disobedience

[contemptible, contemptibility, contemptibly, contemptibleness, contemptuous]

-Jocelyn gave the clumsy waiter a **contemptuous** smile when he dumped a bowl of soup in her lap.

**Correlate:** (noun) a phenomenon that accompanies another phenomenon, is usually parallel to it, and is related in some way to it

[correlation, correlated, correlating]

Studies have shown a <u>correlation</u> between reduced work load and increased productivity.

**Exile:** (noun) the state or a period of either forced or voluntary absence from one's country or home [exiles, exiled, exilic]

-Suffering from an ailment of the liver, Napoleon Bonaparte died on St. Helena Island, a victim of <u>exile</u> and suspected poisoning.

**Inconsequential:** (adjective) irrelevant or of no significance

[inconsequentially, inconsequentiality]

-The suspect's argument of innocence was futile and <u>inconsequential</u>; the detective had video footage of him committing the crime.

**Obsolete**: (adjective) no longer in use or no longer useful; old-fashioned

[obsoleteness, obsoletely]

-Rory and Cullen stared at the rotary dial telephone, an **obsolete** relic from the past which they had no idea how to use.

**Pious:** (adjective) showing loyal respect for a person or thing, especially a religion

[piously, piousness, piety]

-Clergymen are considered to be especially **pious**, devoting most of their time to helping others in the name of their faith.

**Reverence:** (noun) a gesture of respect; profound adoring awed respect shown or felt

[reverential, revere]

-Rayleigh stared at the Notre Dame Cathedral in <u>reverential</u> awe of the talent required to create such an ornate building.

**Scheme:** (noun) a plan or program of action, especially a crafty or secret one [scheming, schemer, schemed]

-Detective Hawkins wasn't quite sure what his wife was **scheming** for his birthday party, but he knew she had something in the works.

**Sententious:** (adjective) given to or abounding in excessive moralizing; terse in expression; having meaning

[sententiously, sententiousness]

-The writer often lapsed into **sententious** reverie, making the plot of the novel drag on at a snail's pace.

Unrequited: (adjective) not reciprocated or returned in kind

-It is said that Dante Alighieri spent most of his adult life suffering under the strain of the <u>unrequited</u> love he felt for his dear Beatrice.
